The park is located in Gainesville, FL.


## AN EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY











### MARCH PROGRAM: A PRESENTATION BY DR. RYAN OF USF:





For the program at our March Meeting, we enjoyed "an evening of seriously weird mineralogy" with Dr. Jeffrey Ryan, Professor of Geology in the School of Geosciences at USF and his seagoing adventures on IODP Expedition 366 to the Mariana forearc, where the Science Team drilled into all sorts of strange and unexpected mineral assemblages erupting on the floor of the Pacific Ocean" ...

When you type "Marianas Trench" into Google Maps, you will find a red "pin" dropped in a very, very vast ocean of blue. Zooming out, it takes quite a bit before you see any reference to land—the most recognizable for us being the island of Guam, which is 365 km or 226 miles away. Which is itself 7,195 miles from the continental United States.

As explained to us by Dr. Ryan, the Marianas Trench (aka Forearc) is the deepest part of the ocean —SEVEN miles below the surface of the Earth. Dr Ryan traveled there to join the International Ocean Discovery Program [IODP] —with scientists from 30 other countries, to study the phenomena of the mud volcanoes that ring one edge of the trench. These volcanoes are made up of serpentine, but with core drilling samples, they determined that a lot more was going on inside these mounds. A whole kaleidoscope of chemical reactions are producing calcite, boron, olivine, sulfates, garnets and methane—and much more! All in an environment of highly acidic water.

Dr. Ryan told us of the ship that he was on, The Joides Resolution, which had some amazing features, such as stabilizers that kept the ship in place so that the massive core drilling equipment could be placed accurately within a 3% tolerance! Also, the derrick of the drill moved with the swells vertically, floating in place! Dr. Ryan shared some of the cultural aspects of the trip too—birthdays and holidays were observed, including the Scots enjoying a Robert Burns celebration complete with haggis and then ushering in the New Year with Auld Lang Syne on bagpipes.

Many thanks to Dr. Ryan for a seriously fascinating presentation!

## GEMSTONE OF THE MONTH: Diamond-Green Diamonds!



Since the Celebrity World is all a-flutter over the latest engagement of Jen and Ben [Jennifer Lopez and Ben Affleck], of course we will have to discuss the extremely rare GREEN DIAMOND that J.Lo is now seen sporting on her left hand.

The occurrence of truly green diamonds is an extremely rare. The green color is caused by the gem being exposed to a source of radiation, either uranium or thorium—over millions of years. The radiation alters the outer layer of electrons or carbon atoms in the diamond, and this changes the way that light passes through the stone resulting in different levels of intensity of green. Typically only a thin band of color is present, where the stone that Ben presented to Jen is an exceptionally rare stone with uniform saturation of a yellow-green throughout. Some gemologist, while cutting and polishing these rare gemstones will leave an area unpolished, called a "natural" which serves as proof that the stone's color is genuine.

The exposure to radiation in these aforementioned diamonds was naturally occurring, although it is very common for stones to be irradiated by man-made means to achieve, for example, a blue topaz. The companies that use radiation for this must be registered with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and store the stones in a secure manner until the radiation dissipates enough for safe wearing.

Other famous green diamonds are the Dresden, a pear-cut beauty first mentioned in a newspaper article in 1772. A hefty 41 carats, it is not known if the rough was first mined in India or Brazil. The Aurora Green, 5.03 carat square cut with an amazing VS2 clarity is set in a ring, surrounded by pink round diamonds and it sold at auction for a price of \$16.2 million in 2016. Ms. Lopez's ring, 8.5 carat green-yellow gem is valued at \$8.5 million dollars—gasp!

### SGAMS OFFERINGS FOR MEMBERS —

Our club offers shop time to its members at a cost of \$3.00 per hour or any part of the hour. Classes are open shop with a monitor to provide assistance as needed.

In cabbing, participants will learn the basics of cutting, forming, and polishing a simple cabochon.

Faceting is the art of cutting and polishing angled faces on a gemstone; this class is at a cost of \$65.00 and the student will cut and polish one round brilliant stone.

Wire wrapping basic class allows you to set precious and semi-precious gemstones into simple metal frameworks made out of copper, silver, gold, and other materials.

Silversmithing class is to help with foundational silversmithing skills and finishing suitable for the novice or those with limited experience.

Wax casting is a \$50.00 class which includes one 3 inch flask, in two sessions, which involve investing spruced trees in preparation for the burnout process and then melting and pouring into the remaining cavity to produce the cast pieces. Finishing of the cast pieces is minimal and participants are encouraged to attend the Silversmithing Lab if they wish help in this last stage.
