FUN FACTS

Gold is an elemental mineral which is also considered a precious metal. In pure form, it is so soft that it can be shaped by hand. In fact, an ounce of pure gold (roughly the size of a matchbox) can be flattened into a sheet the size of a tennis court, or stretched to create a wire 50 miles long. The largest pure nugget of gold was discovered in 1869, in Australia, and weighed in at approximately 156 pounds – enough to create a gold sheet larger than four football fields, or a wire which could wrap the circumference of earth approximately 5 times!

Pumice is a very light rock – in fact, its name is derived from the Latin word pumex, meaning foam. Pumice is the only rock that floats – though its sponge-like texture will absorb water until it eventually becomes saturated with liquid, and sinks.

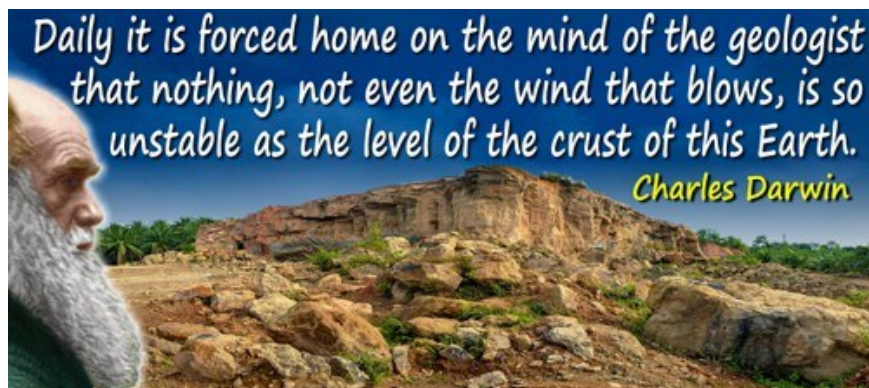


The Incas believed that **rhodochrosite**, which they called Inca Rose, formed from the blood of their former kings and queens. This connection to their royal ancestry led them to associate Inca Rose with the power to resolve inner conflict or problems with grace, and release the suffering of past lives.

The Labrador Inuit have a legend which tells how light fell from the sky, and was trapped in the rocks on the ocean coast. One day, a traveling warrior stumbled across these same stones. Striking the rocks with his spear, he tried to set the light free. He released the Northern Lights into the sky, but some of the light remained trapped in the stone. This is what give **labradorite** its brilliant color, and stunning flashes of light.

Gem of The Month: Amethyst

Amethyst is a variety of quartz that grows in violet hues due to irradiation or impurities in iron. Shades can range from very light, pinkish-purple shades to deep violet tones, and can feature sparkles of red and blue, depending on the trace elements and precision of the stone's cut. Amethyst is one of the rare gemstones that only comes in shades of purple; while quartz takes on many different colors, each color of quartz has a specific name.

Its name derives from the Greek "amethystos", which means "not drunken", as Amethyst in antiquity was thought to ward off drunkenness.

In Greece, the word "geode" means "shape of the earth." Amethyst Geodes are formed when gas bubbles in lava try to rise to the surface but can't due to fast-cooling, thickening lava at the top. The trapped bubbles form hollow cavities. Water that includes traces of silica and minerals below the lava is forced up, penetrating the hollow cavities. Over millions of years, crystals begin to grow inside the cavities according to what minerals were in the water.



Amethyst Cathedrals are a combination of natural crystals and man-made techniques. The geode is cut in half, revealing nature's beautiful work. Then, cement is added on the outside of the geode and along the bottom to form a base. The cement is painted black and the crystals are polished.

Prior to the 19th century, Amethyst was a precious stone since it was as rare as emerald and ruby stones. One large deposits of Amethyst Geodes were found in Brazil, Amethyst was downgraded to a semi-precious stone.



Throughout history, Amethyst has been known as the Bishop's Stone since it symbolized ecclesiastical dignity. Bishops continue to wear Amethysts on the second finger of their right hand to this day.



Despite its name, the infamous "Delhi sapphire" is in fact a purple amethyst! The stone was stolen from an Indian temple and is said to be cursed! The amethyst was found by a young curator in the British Natural History Museum's vaults, along with a letter from its previous owner warning that it brought bad luck. He ignored the message in the letter, and took the stone to a science symposium, where he was caught in a horrific thunderstorm and fell ill with kidney stones. Despite this amethyst's dangerous reputation, it is currently on display in the Natural History Museum in London.
