Random Rock Facts!

- Copper gives **malachite** its beautiful green color. Malachite was used for green pigment in paints from the distant past up until around the 1800s.
- **Lapis Lazuli** was mined as far back as 7,000 BCE and was particularly beloved by the Indus Valley civilization.
- A single gram of **gold** can be beaten into an 11 square foot sheet. Gold leaf can be beaten until it turns semitransparent.
- Some of the largest crystals ever found were comprised of selenite.
 Located in the Naica Mine's Cave of the Crystals, the largest specimen found was 39 feet long and weighed 55 tons.





- **Peridot** is found both on Earth and in space. In 2005, the Stardust Space Probe returned to Earth covered in comet dust that contained peridot particles.
- Amethyst comes from the Greek word ametusthos, which means "not intoxicated."
 This name was given to the stone because it was believed to protect its wearer from intoxication. Today, amethyst is still considered a symbol of sobriety and moderation.
- **Jasper** is traceable to all ancient peoples and civilizations. Worn by shamans, priests and kings, it was considered sacred and a powerful protection stone.
- Tanzanite was given its name by Tiffany and Co. who named it after Tanzania, the country in which it was discovered. The scientific name of "blue-violet zoisite" was not thought to be sufficiently consumer friendly by Tiffany's marketing.



Dave also talked about his wire wrapping class, which includes a basic class that allows you to learn how to measure the area to be wrapped, wires used, and wrapping a stone.

Dave Watson also filled in for Joe Cooper with a talk about the Wax casting class offered. The class involves investing sprued trees in preparation for the burnout process and then melting and pouring into the remaining cavity to produce the cast pieces.

Finishing of the cast pieces is minimal, and participants are encouraged to attend the silversmithing lab if they would like help in this last stage.

Be aware of scams!

We have had reports of some of our club members being reached out to by scammers. These scammers are pretending to be club members or leaders and are asking for gift cards. We want to emphasize that no SGAMS member will **ever** ask you for gift cards.

Be aware of these 4 common scams

"I thought it was someone from the bank!"

Scammers are professional imposters. They'll pretend to be a relative, a utility company or even Bank of America.

"They said I had an overdue bill."

Scammers want to make you panic and overreact without thinking. A loved one in trouble, a late bill or an amazing deal are all tactics to throw you off.

"She needed my account info right away."

Scammers will want your money fast. They'll tell you to send funds immediately, often via wire transfer or payment apps, where the money is unlikely to be recovered.

"He was so friendly."

Scammers often use social media to deceive. They'll try to befriend you, strike up a relationship, then hit you with exclusive "insider" deals and get-rich-quick schemes.

Please be aware of these scammers.

Do not send them gift cards or money.

Please reach out to us and inform us if you receive an email along these lines.

Included are some tips for scams in general. Be safe, be smart!

Buying a gift card to pay someone? Stop! It's a scam.

Gift cards are for gifts, not payments.
