SFMS 2006 William Holland Workshop at Young Harris, Georgia

2006 Workshop Dates

June......Sunday, June 11 to Saturday, June 17, 2006
October..Sunday, October 8 to Saturday, October 14, 2006

Check in is on Sunday after 3 p.m. and departure is Saturday morning after breakfast.

The William Holland School of Lapidary Arts is situated on a mountain in north Georgia near the North Carolina border. The facility includes a two-story main building known as the Sparks Lodge with 29 air-conditioned bedrooms on the upper floor. A second lodge is located nearby with 22 additional air-conditioned bedrooms. All bedrooms are motel-like with private baths and two beds. Two rooms are equipped for the handicapped.

The lower, ground level of the Sparks Lodge houses 13 classrooms, the kitchen, and dining room. This floor is completely air-conditioned, and a new elevator permits easy access to both floors.

There are two other buildings that make up the retreat complex: the Seabolt Building, which houses the George Kasper Memorial Library as well as showers and restroom facilities for the campground, and Mary Lou's Cottage, to house the instructional staff. The campground has 10 full hook-up spaces for RV's up to 40 feet in length.

Fees

Lodge accommodations: \$310 per person double occupancy, including meals. Single room: \$470.

Day Students: \$140 per person, no meals are included.

Campground Students: \$120 hookup (including. 2 persons; \$25 per additional person), \$140 per person for classes. No meals are included but are available directly from the retreat.

Meals: Breakfast \$5, lunch \$6, dinner \$7.

Registration Procedures

Applications from members of SFMS clubs will be accepted first; however, members of other AFMS clubs may apply and will be scheduled following SFMS applicants.

Applications will be accepted beginning on January 17, 2006 for both sessions. The postmark date on or after this date determines the order of acceptance. First-time attendees have an extra priority.

Students under age 18 are welcome, but they must be accompanied by a responsible adult and must be approved by the workshop director and instructor.

Reservation Deposit

A non-refundable administrative fee of \$50 per person must accompany all applications. The full amount may be remitted with the application if the applicant wishes. (It is easier for the Registrar.) The balance is due 4 weeks before the workshop begins. No reminders will be sent.

Cancellation Policy

There is a \$50 nonrefundable charge to cover administrative costs. An additional \$50 charge will be assessed for cancellations made less than 4 weeks before a session begins. No refund will be returned for cancellations within 7 days of the start of a session. A minimum of three students must be enrolled in a particular class to support the cost of the class. No fee will be charged if a class is canceled. No adjustment will be made for late arrival or early departure.

Bill Schmidt will be working at the clubhouse during the summer. He will be there on Tuesday nights in case members want to use the machines, and he will also be doing general maintenance on the machines.

Minutes of Board Meeting August 1, 2006

The board met in a special session to consider the clubhouse issues and other matters. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. Present were President Dave Cordes, who chaired the meeting, and Bill Schmidt, Sue Black, Sue Hazelden, Walt Upman, Evie Loster, and Julia Larson.

Dave stated that during the summer, there had been issues with getting the architect to follow through in making the necessary changes to the plans. Several board members had been discussing whether to contact one of the local television stations to ask for their assistance through one of their consumer programs. This information had been relayed to Mr. Killion, who had in turn advised Mr. Jager of this possibility. Mr. Killion had phoned Sue Hazelden this afternoon (August 1) that he had picked up the plans from Mr. Jager and was prepared to take them to the county zoning commission on August 2 after he (Killion) had reviewed them. The suggestion to contact the television stations was tabled for later discussion should we encounter additional problems with the plans. Mr. Killion said most of the changes were minor in nature and should not impose much additional cost.

Sue Hazelden presented the end of year treasurer's report which was accepted for audit on a unanimous vote. She also said the CD was due for rollover September 4. Since we may be using some of this money for construction costs during the next quarter, the board voted not to roll it over at this time, but to place it in a new money market account where it would be readily available.

Sue Hazelden said the Azalea meeting site for 2007 has been confirmed. She also mentioned that the insurance company needed verification of proper mounting of our fire extinguishers. Since they have not been inspected recently, Bill and Dave volunteered to handle this.

Dave and Sue Black initiated a discussion about the 2007 show, specifically the postcards for vendors, advertising, flyers, etc. Committee assignments for the show and the club were discussed. Evie volunteered to take over the duties of membership chair from Sue Hazelden.

Julia discussed the lack of participation in the Federation workshops and asked for suggestions. Several ideas were discussed and will be passed on to the Education Committee at the SFMS meeting in Nashville later this month. Julia will be attending as the upcoming Education Chair and the official SGAMS club proxy.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m..

The following reports were given: Sue Black: Money from the vendors for next year's show is coming in and all will be paid by January. The flyers need to done by October. Bill Schmidt is handling the physical setup and Mary Abel is in charge of demonstrators. We need a new security company for this show. Bill and Sue Black will work on finding one that is acceptable.

Sue Hazelden: The Treasurer's report was presented and accepted for audit. Last year's audit was completed by the primary auditor and is under review by the second. Members discussed the various options for maximizing return on the club's funds while we engage in renovations for the clubhouse. The property tax will be due in December. Sue has requested display space from the library for next February. Don Schlough sent two boxes of rocks for club use. She also mentioned the Rock & Gem listing has some errors; the corrected information has to be submitted to the magazine by January. Walt Upman will handle this. Sue has made repeated attempts to contract life members M/M Carpenter with no response. She recommended dropping them from the roster. The board voted to make it so.

Julia Larson: Attended the SFMS quarterly meeting in Nashville in August. The entire Education Committee was present and held a lengthy meeting focusing on several areas, but primarily on the dwindling attendance at the workshops. Several new approaches are being planned for the 2007 workshops, including a Family Week at the June session at William Holland. More on this when the schedule is finalized. The Education Committee will start relying on newsletter editors to publish more information regarding the workshops and to make sure this information is available each month at their club meetings.

Dave Cordes: The clubhouse situation remains stalled. The plans were to be returned to the architect for two minor changes, but Mr. Killion, who is handling this, has been injured and Dave has not been able to contact him. He will try to visit Mr. Killion at home during the next week or so, to see what the situation is. The fire extinguisher question remains open. We will probably have to purchase new ones, since the ones we have are quite old. Dave and Bill will handle this.

Dave also discussed the club's website, which currently is only partially accessible. Debbie will look into this. Dave asked about the program she used for the newsletter (PageMaker), and Debbie agreed to copy an entire edition on a disk and get it to Dave.


Dave purchased some sign holders and will have signs made for committees, grounds work, etc., which will be displayed at each meeting.
